Some Facts About Rape

- A rape occurs approximately once every 8 minutes.
- Approximately 1 in 4 women in college have been victimized by rape.
- 7-10% of all adult rape victims are male.
- About 90% of all college rapes are acquaintance rapes.
- Alcohol is the most common “date rape drug.”
- Rape is the most under-reported crime in the United States.



R.E.S.P.E.C.T. is a group of men and women who provide educational presentations on sexual assault issues through peer health education. We are students helping other students to understand the issues of sexual assault violence and prevention. These programs are developed specifically for the target audience—college students and prospective college students.

R.E.S.P.E.C.T. presentations average 50-60 minutes in length. They are interactive, multi-media designed to address a variety of issues that emphasize risk reduction strategies for both becoming a potential rape victim or perpetrator. Also, issues that lend to victim blaming are explored with the goal of achieving a campus environment that is victim-supportive and has “zero tolerance for rape.”

At the end of each presentation, resource information is provided so that individuals may seek additional information or professional help, if needed.

What are Peer Health Educators?

Peer Health Educators develop and present programs about issues such as sexual assault violence, alcohol use, and related topics. Promoting responsible, informed decision making and acting as a student source are goals for all Peer Health Educators.

Peer Health Educators are an effective tool in the education of students. Students may be more comfortable talking about some health issues with other students. Peer Health Educators can personalize the prevention message and give a more personal outlook on the topic of sexual assault issues. Often, students may be more likely to listen and relate to other students.
